

The First Reading

Genesis 12:1-9

Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

So Abram went, as the Lord had told him; and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran. Abram took his wife Sarai and his brother's son Lot, and all the possessions that they had gathered, and the persons whom they had acquired in Haran; and they set forth to go to the land of Canaan. When they had come to the land of Canaan, Abram passed through the land to the place at Shechem, to the oak of Moreh. At that time the Canaanites were in the land. Then the Lord appeared to Abram, and said, "To your offspring I will give this land." So he built there an altar to the Lord, who had appeared to him. From there he moved on to the hill country on the east of Bethel, and pitched his tent, with Bethel on the west and Ai on the east; and there he built an altar to the Lord and invoked the name of the Lord. And Abram journeyed on by stages toward the Negeb.

The Second Reading

Romans 4:13-25

The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised.

Therefore his faith “was reckoned to him as righteousness.” Now the words, “it was reckoned to him,” were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.



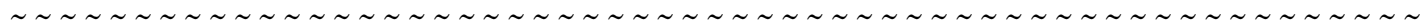

Governance Update

Beginning last spring, the Vestry engaged in a long overdue institutional governance review, made more pressing with the building of a permanent middle school and taking on more debt. The primary goal was to analyze how our governance structure and protocols correlate with the Canons of the Episcopal Church, with a secondary focus on updating and improving the function of our internal systems. In February, the Vestry and Day School Board held a joint retreat led by a governance consultant and canon lawyer, to explore the collective understanding of how our governance systems align and where they require improvement. These efforts were reported at the Parish Annual Meeting the next day. Since then, the leadership of the Vestry and the Board have worked together to identify next steps. Most recently, at the May Coordinating Committee meeting, we agreed to establish the St. Patrick's Governance Task Force as an ad hoc committee charged with systematically surfacing and addressing governance issues. The committee met this week and will continue its work this summer. The committee consists of Donna Murphy (Vestry Clerk), JB Meek (Vestry member), Laura Schifter (Trustee and incoming Governance Committee chair) and Tiffany King (incoming Board Chair).
